School Rules for Cell Phones and Smart Watches

It has been reported that during the school day some students have been taking pictures and videos of other students without their consent and posting these on social media and other web based sites. This is a reminder that during school hours Cell phones, smart watches and any other device that can send and receive data, must be turned off and put away. Students are not allowed to bring these items out during class time or recess times. Devices that are not put away during the school day will be confiscated and a parent will have to pick up these items from the school. Students with these devices are discouraged from bringing them to school and the school assumes no liability if they are lost or stolen. If there is an emergency on campus parents will be notified by an automated call from the principal or the school district. Students may use the school phone if they have a personal emergency or if they have been injured. If parents need to reach their student during the school day, they should call the school office. Parents and Students should make all transportation, childcare arrangements and play dates should be arranged prior to your child arriving to school.

FREE Breakfast Program



SEL Core Competencies: Social Awareness

What is Empathy?

Being empathic means that you have the ability to understand and share the feelings of others.

Be kind for everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle.
-Plato

Why do we need to provide opportunity to practice empathy?

A child's ability to employ higher order thinking skills is not fully developed until their mid to late twenties. To be empathetic, you must be able to understand the complex relationship between cause and effect, which is a higher order thinking skill. It is important to remember that our brains are malleable and our ability to empathize with the world around us is always growing. Because of this, it is important to offer children the opportunity, in safe and stress free environments, to put themselves in "someone else's shoes." It is through this practice that new neural networks are developed that strengthen a person's ability to be truly empathetic.

Let's Practice empathy everywhere! What can you do at home?

• Have your child go through clothes, toys, and books that he/she no longer uses and donate them to a local charity. In this process, talk about the reason for the donation and the intent behind the donation. For example, ask your child what items they have that are still in a useable condition that another child may want. In other words, cleaning out your closet to get rid of ripped or broken items is not the same as donating items that could still be treasured by others.
